2 UPDATE ON THE VOLUNTEERS IN SERVICE TO AMERICA (VISTA) PROGRAM

Chris Lopez, Neighborhood and Family Services, said the VISTA program is managed through Avondale's Youth and Community Engagement Division. It was founded nationally in 1965 as a service program, and was incorporated into the AmeriCorps network of programs in 1993. Through VISTA, volunteers make year-long, full-time commitments to engage in capacity building within non-profit organizations that are dedicated to bringing people out of poverty. The VISTA Program is the foundation of Avondale's Education and Community Engagement Initiative. Volunteers are engaged in various activities such as addressing low income resident housing issues; encouraging parents to take active and engaged roles in education; connecting residents to technology available through the libraries; funneling volunteers to support schools and non-profits; and educating residents on consumer scams, predatory lending and crime prevention. VISTA members serve in three City departments: Neighborhood and Family Services; Parks, Recreation and Libraries; and the Police Department.

Mr. Lopez explained that City Council approved bringing five VISTA members to Avondale in 2014. In FY 2015, the City took on a portion of the costs associated with the program. The City began by offering a \$150 per month stipend to supplement the housing allowance of volunteers, and to incentivize them to choose Avondale as their place of service. Recruitment has been a challenge, however, and currently there are still two open placement opportunities. To address this, the City has opted to increase the housing allowance to \$300 per month in order to enhance Avondale's competitiveness.

Mr. Lopez stated that the program has generated over 7,000 hours of volunteer service since it was initiated in Avondale. This equates to \$164,992 in value for the service. VISTA members have also generated \$7,960 in sponsorships, donations and grant funds. In the Police Department, volunteers have created an inventory of crime prevention materials; developed crime prevention training modules for volunteers; and created a Crime Scene

Technician program at Estrella Mountain Community College. The Parks, Recreation and Libraries Program VISTA members have generated a partnership with One Step Beyond, instituted a vocational training program; recruited volunteers, and strengthened the Friends of Libraries Organization. The Neighborhood and Family Services VISTA member conducted research on volunteer management systems; developed grant applications; recruited volunteers; and developed a pilot program to get parents involved in classrooms and school campuses.

Mr. Lopez reported that Avondale also benefits from the work of National Civilian Community Corps volunteers who have conducted a housing study, introduced a variety of community enhancements within parks, started an energy conservation and education program, engaged in a wetlands cleanup project, and painted homes for low income, bedridden homeowners. Avondale has also been awarded a Summer Associate Program. Summer associates spend eight to ten weeks doing direct service in the community. The 2015 team was able to provide STEM programming to 317 youth, which led to improved scores in mathematics and reading.

Mr. Lopez explained that the third year of the agreement is coming to a close, and is due to expire on February 7, 2017. AmeriCorps has indicated that Avondale has well exceeded its performance measures, and has excelled with its VISTA resources. The Corporation for National Community Service has requested that Avondale submit concept papers for a second project award.

Council Member Kilgore inquired about the recruitment process. Mr. Lopez explained that Avondale posts for recruits through the AmeriCorps VISTA website, and volunteers typically come from out of state. Opportunities are also available through local colleges and universities.

Vice Mayor Karlin asked about the Summer Team Employment Program. Mr. Lopez said the program has been in existence since 2008. Opportunities are offered to about 20 Avondale youth per year, ranging in age from 16 to 21. They receive 40 hours of work readiness training, and are placed in various City departments and non-profit organizations. Youth are paid minimum wage for eight weeks of work, during which they are mentored.

Council Member Nielson inquired whether Avondale would be able to apply for additional years after the first course has concluded. Mr. Lopez responded that Avondale has been invited to apply again, and would be eligible for two annual renewals after the first year.

Mayor Weise asked whether the volunteers are asked to provide feedback at the end of their residency. Mr. Lopez explained that volunteers are given the opportunity to discuss the program so that the results can be articulated in future recruitment efforts.

3 INFORMATION REGARDING THE CITY'S RECYCLABLE MATERIALS PROCESSING SERVICES

Cindy Blackmore, Public Works Director, stated that Avondale provides weekly curbside comingled recycling service. The City's 21,000 customers are each provided 90-gallon bins.

About 5,000 tons is recycled annually, helping the community meet sustainability goals and avoid landfill costs. Two staff people are assigned to ensure that the program runs smoothly. The contamination rate is about 20%. Staff works with customers to provide the information they need to recycle properly, and most issues are resolved quickly. The program is based on positive reinforcement, rather than punitive action.

Ms. Blackmore said Avondale currently uses Friedman Recycling, which is in the third year of a five-year contract that includes two renewal options. The contract establishes a base payment of \$38.25 per ton, with additional revenue sharing depending on the state of the commodities markets. Commodities have dropped in value recently, so no revenue is currently being shared. The contract automatically has a 20% reduction for contamination. At the end of March, Friedman gave notice that they will not be accepting any renewals on their contract, which means that the current agreement will end on July 1, 2016.

Ms. Blackmore said that when commodity prices are low, recycling becomes less profitable, and some facilities have closed as a result. The way people go about recycling can also affect market prices, so there is a need to continually invest in recycling education. Recycling markets have to be developed in the U.S. to replace reduced demand from China. If existing industries would put a greater emphasis on using recycled materials in their products it would help stabilize the recycling market nationally. It is also important that recyclable processors receive sustainable deals.

Ms. Blackmore explained that in the wake of the Friedman notice, staff began exploring new options. Glendale indicated that their facility will not be an option moving forward. The City of Phoenix, however, did reach out to discuss the development of an agreement that would benefit both cities and be sustainable through market cycles. Rather than go through the bidding route, the goal this time was to find a solution that would make positive impacts on the programs of both cities over the long term. Staff has been working with the City of Phoenix to draft an intergovernmental agreement. In its current form, the IGA calls for an initial three-year term, with two one-year renewals. A 180-day cancellation clause is included. The contract establishes a revenue sharing agreement based on a blended rate that increases as commodity prices increase. There is no deduction for contamination.

Vice Mayor Karlin inquired about the biggest source of contamination. Ms. Blackmore said plastic bags are the biggest offenders in the blue bins, and are best recycled elsewhere. Vice Mayor Karlin suggested that placing informative stickers on the blue bins would help lower the contamination rate. She noted that while recycling might not always make money, it still saves money because it reduces the cost of sending material to the landfill, which saves the City \$125,000 per year. She inquired about the cost of sending recyclables to Phoenix. Ms. Blackmore responded that the cost would remain the same, because the new facility is only two miles away from the current one. Vice Mayor Karlin felt the base rate in the Phoenix agreement was too low.

Council Member Nielson asked whether Avondale would continue to check for contamination even if the new agreement does not charge for it. Ms. Blackmore confirmed that Avondale will continue to focus on education to teach people how to correctly recycle. If the contamination rate were allowed to get out of control, processors would not be able to handle the materials. Council Member Nielson asked about the City's option should all

recyclable processors close. Ms. Blackmore said the worst case scenario would be to return to sending material to the landfills. She emphasized, however, that recycling is here to stay, as it is important to the community and protects natural resources.

Council Member Kilgore asked whether Phoenix partners with any other cities on recycling. Ms. Blackmore indicated they deal with a number of different cities and private companies.

Vice Mayor Karlin inquired why Avondale did not issue an RFP for other waste management company bids. Ms. Blackmore explained that staff felt that the Phoenix agreement was the best option for Avondale because it presents a long-term solution to the program, instead of relying on a series of short-term solutions.

In response to an inquiry from Mayor Weise, Ms. Blackmore said that given the state of the commodities market and the limited options available, any new bids from recyclers would be very unlikely to come anywhere close to offering a \$38.25 per ton base rate as the current agreement does. Mayor Weise asked whether this unexpected development would impact the recycling budget. Ms. Blackmore responded that while the City may see some downturn in revenue at the beginning while the markets are down, the current rates are expected to be able to absorb any losses. David Fitzhugh noted that the rate is structured to cover the operating costs of the program, and revenue is not ongoing within that budget.

Andrew McGuire noted that staff will bring forward the new IGA to City Council for their approval at the June 20 meeting. Mayor Weise requested an update 90 days after the start of the new contract.

4 ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business before the Council, Council Member Kilgore moved to adjourn the regular meeting into executive session. Council Member Nielson seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

5 CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT AWARD - NESBITT CONTRACTING COMPANY, INC. FOR MCDOWELL RD IMPROVEMENTS

A request to approve a Construction Contract with Nesbitt Contracting Company, Inc. to provide construction services for the McDowell Road Improvements in the amount of \$2,758,396.15, authorize the necessary transfers, and authorize the Mayor, or City Manager and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents.

Chris Hamilton, Engineering Project Manager reviewed the scope of this project. The first phase will include full improvements from the Agua Fria River bridge to 119th Avenue and will include a landscaped median, a buffered bike lane, sidewalks on the south side, drainage upgrades and upgrade to LED streetlights on the north side and new LED streetlights on the south side. The second phase will include pavement replacement from 119th Avenue to Avondale Blvd.

Mr. Hamilton indicated that this project is ready to move ahead after being temporarily put on hold due to a bid protest but the matter has been resolved. Construction is expected to start the first of July and conclude in December. Staff will coordinate with the contractor working at Friendship Park to make sure the park can be accessed when it reopens in September. He concluded by saying that every effort will be to maintain one lane in each direction open at all times.

Mayor Weise asked a question regarding drainage beyond 119th Avenue towards Avondale Blvd. Mr. Hamilton indicated that a retention basin was installed recently at 119th Avenue and McDowell which staff hopes will help prevent flooding. He indicated that staff is not planning to make any improvements in that section at this time so as not to tie the hands of future developers.

Council Member Nielson expressed support and enthusiasm for the project.

Council Member Nielson moved to approve a Construction Contract with Nesbitt Contracting Company, Inc. to provide construction services for the McDowell Road Improvements in the amount of \$2,758,396.15, authorize the necessary transfers, and authorize the Mayor, or City Manager and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents. Council Member Kilgore seconded the motion.

6 2016 END OF SESSION REPORT

A wrap-up report of key bills heard during the 2016 State Legislature 52nd Legislature – Second Regular Session and information on the League of Arizona Cities & Towns Annual Resolution Process. Resolutions will be adopted at the League's Annual Conference August 23 - 26, 2016. For information and direction only.

Ms. Jessica Blazina, Assistant Director Intergovernmental Affairs indicated that the Arizona State Legislature adjourned sine die on May 7th after 170 days in session. She indicated that out of 388 bills passed and sent to the Governor, 374 bills were signed. Most bills will become effective August 6th.

She indicated that Governor Ducey signed the \$9.1 billion budget on May 10th which included the \$20.7 million which represents the fee for service payment that cities and towns were charged. This is an issue that cities and towns have been unsuccessfully trying to have removed but will try again next year.

Ms. Blazina reviewed a few bills:

HB 2016 – this bill would have eliminated the residential rental tax and have had a \$22 million impact on cities and towns' budgets. While it was defeated for this session, it is likely to be brought back next year.

MB 2483 - cities and towns fought hard to get this bill passed and it will allow cities and towns to use municipal population estimates for purposes of shared state revenue distribution. This bill had an emergency clause and became effective immediately after being signed by Governor Ducey on May 17th.

HB 2495 – was a bill supported by PIR that will allocate about \$1.5 million to the office of tourism for marketing purposes once PIR invests \$100 million in facility improvements. While the League did not actively support this bill, the City of Avondale supported along with PIR.

HB 2568 – allows for the formation and governance of community facilities district for parcels over 600 acres of non-contiguous property. She indicated this bill was heavily lobbied and was finally passed, however Governor Ducey vetoed the bill on May 10th. She recognized Representatives Cardenas and Espinoza who took a solid stand in opposition of the bill.

SB 1428 – this bill is tied to Prop 124 for changes to the Public Safety Retirement System. The proposition was approved by the voters at the May 17th election.

Ms. Blazina stated work has started on next year's session. The League has started working on the resolutions within the committees. Proposed resolutions will be reviewed by committees and forward their recommendations to the Resolutions Committee. Avondale is represented by Vice Mayor Karlin in the Neighborhoods, Quality of Life and Sustainability and General Administration, Human Resources, and Elections Committees; Council member Nielson represents Avondale in the Public Safety, Military Affairs, and Courts Committee. Mayor Weise will represent Avondale at the Full Resolutions Committee in August.

Mayor Weise asked Council Members to thank Representatives Cardenas and Espinoza for standing by Avondale on their support on HB 2568. He added that it was clear that Governor Ducey listened to Avondale when in his statement vetoing the bill, he used some of the same language Avondale used in its letter to him.

In a response to a question from Mayor Weise, Mr. Fitzhugh indicated that he has spoken to PIR related to their near future projects and while they don't have an exact timeline, it is expected projects will start within the next six months.

Regarding fireworks, Ms. Blazina indicated that some bills were approved and others defeated but the enthusiasm behind the opposition of these bills is fizzling out. She added that unfortunately it is likely the same thing will happen with the rental tax bill.

Vice Mayor Karlin commented that as of a couple of years ago, the League's resolution process has been streamlined by setting up the committees to review and vet proposed resolutions.

In response to a question from Council Member Iwanski, Ms. Blazina indicated that while Avondale enjoys a good relationship and support for its legislators, the attitude and lack of support from the legislature in general is a cause for concern for cities and towns for future years. Council Member Iwanski agreed and indicated that it behooves city councils throughout the state to impress on the legislature and the governor the need to learn and understand city issues and recognize that cities are the most immediate level of government responsive to residents.

Vice Mayor Karlin commented she agreed with Council Member Iwanski and expressed her hope for Avondale to continue to have that level of relationship with legislators. She added that because cities are non-partisan, the League could take a stronger role to educate legislators throughout the state about how cities work.

Mayor Weise called on every council member to do their part to continue to build the city's relationship with the legislature.

7 RESOLUTION 3316-6161 - INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR A COMMUNITY PARAMEDICINE PILOT PROGRAM

A resolution authorizing an Intergovernmental Agreement with the cities of Goodyear, Surprise, Peoria, and the Sun City Fire District to create a Community Paramedicine Pilot Program and to accept and authorize the Mayor or City Manager and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents.

Troy Lutrick, Sr. Advisor for Emergency Preparedness, Fire and Medical reviewed an opportunity the Fire and Medical Department has to expand its capabilities. He explained that there are only two options when emergency medical service is required from a 911 call. He explained a patient may either be transported to an ER or sign a refusal to transport and stay home with instructions to follow up on their own with their family doctor or at an urgent care facility.

Community Paramedicine is a new option aimed in part at reducing the cost of healthcare. He indicated the goal is to triage better and allow patients to receive the most appropriate level of care based on their condition and reduce the number of readmissions to the ER. He

added not all patients who call 911 need to go to the ER. He explained that the program is useful when the responding crew determines that the patient's condition does not warrant transportation to the ER but there are other conditions that would otherwise require transportation, such as lack of family support. The Community Medicine unit is able to do a safety and social assessment on a patient's condition to connect the patient to his/her personal care physician and possibly other city services. The Community Medicine unit allows 911 crews to focus on true emergencies.

Mr. Lutrick explained that cities that have implemented this program have chosen to focus on different things – Buckeye's program focuses on post-hospital discharge, while Chandler and Rio Rico generally focus on low acuity, behavioral and post-hospital discharge. Mesa has a grant and also focuses on behavioral and post-hospital discharge. Similar programs are also being implemented by Golder Ranch Fire District and Green Valley Fire District. Various cities in several other states and Canada are in the process of implementing similar programs.

Mr. Lutrick indicated that the City of Goodyear has applied for a \$125,000 grant from a Vitalyst Health Foundation to implement a Community Medicine pilot program with the cities of Avondale, Peoria, Surprise and Sun City as partners. He explained that this is the first effort in Arizona that's building on a partnership to share resources. Grant funds will be distributed to pay for overtime for existing personnel to implement the program. The program is expected to last twelve months. Participating personnel will receive appropriate training during the first phase of the program. Once trained, personnel will be deployed in two 2-person units. One unit will serve Avondale and Goodyear and the other Peoria, Surprise and Sun City for about 20 hours per week. Demographic data will be gathered and the program analyzed to then present an operational plan and long term financial impacts.

In response to a question from Vice Mayor Karlin, Mr. Lutrick said that there will be no additional costs for new personnel or equipment. The teams will share existing resources. Vice Mayor Karlin asked how will it be determined what type of response will be deployed to a 911 call. Mr. Lutrick indicated that initially the 911 unit will be deployed automatically as it is currently and call the Community Medicine team if needed. The 911 unit can then be freed up to respond to a true emergency. When in doubt, the 911 unit will proceed with transportation. Mr. Lutrick indicated that the program should allow staff to assess situations better and provide the level of service that a patient truly needs. Vice Mayor Karlin asked if participation in this program will change an employee's pay grade. Mr. Lutrick indicated it would not as the training is on triage and is not an additional certification. A few employees who demonstrate interest in specialized training will be selected to participate in this program.

Council Member Kilgore indicated that he can see the value of the program from his experience when he went on a ride-along with the Fire Department. In response from a question from Council Member Kilgore, Mr. Lutrick explained that the training has not yet been developed but all the details of the program such as training program, number of participants, etc. will be determined by the partnering agencies once their Council have approved their participation.

Council Member Nielson expressed support for this program.

Mayor Weise commented that he can understand the need and benefits of the program, but questioned whether Avondale's population will benefit from the program, he said the other participating cities have a larger elderly population. He asked what type of demographic data will be collected. Mr. Lutrick replied that a variety of information will be collected to determine whether Avondale will benefit from this program and what the cost would be.

Council Member Iwanski asked what percentage of 911 calls are truly 911 calls that require transportation to the ER. Mr. Lutrick replied he has not provided 911 service in Avondale, but that better training and knowledge of resources can allow staff to better respond and educate the public.

Council Member Nielson moved to adopt Resolution 3316-6161 approving an Intergovernmental Agreement with the cities of Goodyear, Peoria, Surprise and Sun city for a Community Paramedicine Pilot program. Council Member Kilgore seconded the motion.
